Days of Action:

[GLSEN's Ally Week](#): Created by GLSEN, Ally week is an opportunity for non-LGBTQQ people to show support in a visible way.

[National Coming Out Day](#): An international awareness day, held every October 11th, that celebrates people who publicly identify as LGBTQQ.

[National Transgender Day of Remembrance](#): Transgender Day of Remembrance (TDOR) is an annual observance on November 20th that honors the memory of those whose lives were lost in acts of anti-transgender violence.

[Asexual Awareness Week](#): Asexual Awareness Week takes place in October and seeks to educate on asexual, aromantic, demisexual, and grey-asexual identities.

[GLSEN's Day of Silence](#): A day of action, usually held in April, in which students across the country vow to take a form of silence to call attention to the silencing effect of anti-LGBT bullying and harassment in school.

[No Name Calling Week](#): Held every January, this is a national week of educational activities aimed at ending name-calling of all kinds and providing schools with the tools and inspiration to launch an ongoing dialogue about ways to eliminate bullying in their communities.

[GLAAD's Spirit Day](#): Held each October, it is a day of action against bullying. People are encouraged to wear purple to show their support.
